1) (40 points: 10,10,10,10)

In a large class, the correlation between number of Facebook friends and score on the midterm is -0.4. (For purposes of this question, assume that everyone is on Facebook.) The 31st percentile of number of Facebook friends is 200. Also, 64 percent of the students have between 200 and 351 Facebook friends. The midterm average is 60 and the SD is 15. The scatter diagram is footbally 95th shaped.

a) If possible, find the avg and SD of number of Facebook friends. If this is not possible, explain


