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COURSE DESCRIPTION

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to a wide range of topics dealing with the nature of **Language**: language structure, language use, language change, and language development. We will look both at examples from English (our common language in the course) as well as other languages, drawing as much as possible from the knowledge and experiences both of the structure and of students in the class.

REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING

Students are required to attend daily lectures, participate in discussion, read the assigned sections of the textbook, and turn in all homework assignments. There also are two in-class midterm examinations on <u>Monday, Feb. 24</u> and <u>Friday April 10</u> and a cumulative final on Monday, May 11, 7-10pm).

Sections are Thursday 10-11, 11-12 and 1-2, but do not meet during the first week. Be sure to attend section during the second week; <u>if you do not show up, you may be dropped</u>.

Grading of the different requirements of the class will be weighted as follows:

We reserve the right to take roll at any time—and in any case often note who is vs. is not attending lectures or sections on a regular basis. **Please let both Prof. Hyman and Ms. Scott know of any problems that affect your attendance or overall performance in the course.**
